Greater Toronto Area Live Here

The City of Toronto's official motto is "Diversity Our Strength," which speaks both to the essence of the Greater Toronto Area and to its residents.

The Greater Toronto Area is the best of all worlds.

The city has, at its very core, exceptional diversity: nearly half of Toronto's 2.7 million residents were born outside Canada. Our city's living mosaic continues to draw the best and the brightest, who come here seeking world-class business, culture and education in one of the safest cities in North America.

They find it, too, in the Fortune 500 company headquarters along Bay Street and various districts of Mississauga; in the research centres throughout the city; in the museums and galleries, literary, music and film festivals that take place throughout the year; and in the numerous educational institutions, of which U of T is a leader.



Celebrations

The city knows how to throw a party. Annual traditions include: the Toronto International Film Festival, which brings hundreds of movies and parties to the city every September; Nuit Blanche, an all-night outdoor art exploration; Caribbean Carnival, one of the largest festivals of Caribbean music, dance and artisanship; North by Northeast (NXNE) Music Festival, a showcase of 1,000+ indie bands, and much more, over three nights; Toronto Jazz Festival, which infuses Nathan Phillips Square with cool jazz on warm nights; and one of the largest Pride Week celebrations in North America.

Transit

Each campus is well connected and accessible to the GTA by public transit. Toronto's transit system (TTC) is fast, clean and reliable. Subways, buses, streetcars and light rail provide frequent and comprehensive access across the region. U of T also offers direct shuttle bus service between U of T Mississauga and U of T St. George. U of T Mississauga students receive a MiWay (Mississauga Transit) travel pass valid for unlimited travel while enrolled in courses. If you prefer self-propelled transportation, you'll love this city of cyclists, with its bike lanes and ubiquitous ring-on-a-stick 'parking' spots.

Mississauga

Just west of Toronto, Mississauga is Canada's sixth largest city. It mixes urban, suburban and natural living. Marvel at the engineering wonder of the Absolute World Towers, 50- and 56-storey towers that torque 180 degrees. Stroll along the 13 km waterfront of Lake Ontario. Catch a pro athletic game at the Paramount Fine Foods Centre. Grab a performance or exhibition at the Living Arts Centre. Shop at Square One, Canada's second largest mall.

Annex

The St. George campus is nestled beside the Annex, a century-old neighbourhood known as much for its intellectual and cultural offerings as for its maple-lined, one-way streets and grand Victorian homes. It is also within walking distance of numerous international communities and Queen Street.

International Villages

All situated close to the St. George campus, you can buy fresh ginger at the Chinatown street market, listen to Fado in Little Portugal, or watch the World Cup at an espresso café in Little Italy. India, Korea and all other curves of the globe are represented, creating Toronto's mosaic that includes numerous communities united by a distinct culture, yet an integral part of the city's overall personality.

Queen Street

Toronto's cool factor is evident along Queen Street West and area. A short distance from the St. George campus, vintage clothing shops and vendors selling handmade jewelry coexist with stores offering the freshest styles from local indie designers. The wide sidewalks are bustling with patios in warm weather and a variety of live music can be found each night of the week ranging from rock to jazz.

Scarborough

Located in the eastern part of Toronto, Scarborough showcases some of the city's most popular and intriguing landmarks. The Scarborough Bluffs are 15 km of earthen cliff shoreline along Lake Ontario. Rouge Park is Canada's first urban national park and the largest urban park in North America. The Toronto Zoo is the world's third largest zoo, renowned for its education and conservation activities. Accessible by public transit, the area is Toronto's greenest, and is also one of the most diverse and multicultural neighbourhoods in the city; U.S. economist Tyler Cowen calls it the "best ethnic food suburb".

Intellectual curiosity is encouraged as students pursue interdisciplinary studies in one of eight Vic One streams focusing on the humanities, social sciences, education, business leadership, physical and mathematical sciences, creative arts and society, and the life sciences. Engage with stimulating guest speakers, experiential learning opportunities, peer mentors and your professors. Enjoy small discussion based seminars that help you develop strong critical thinking, research and writing skills providing you with a solid foundation for success.

Since 2005, the Margaret MacMillan Trinity One program has been a destination for students looking to challenge themselves in an intellectually engaging and supportive environment. WOODSWORTH ONE

Woodsworth One entails small classes and weekly co-curricular meetings that include skills-building workshops, field trips, guest speakers and more. There are two streams. The Popular Culture stream examines music and film and the social behaviours associated with their consumption, exploring how popular culture works and what it means.

Unique Learning Opportunities

U of T offers exceptional range, choice and depth of study. Undergraduate students at U of T can choose from more than 700 academic programs, and they can learn from the best minds and most dedicated teachers in each of these fields of study. 97% of our most accomplished researchers teach undergraduate classes. As a U of T student, you'll want to take advantage of the University's smaller learning environments. Much like the Toronto region, the University is a community of communities. Working with faculty and other students in close-knit learning groups, students can tailor their experiences to their interests and develop passions that will help them make their mark on the world.

Build Your Own Degree: Specialists, Majors and Minors

When building an Arts, Science, or Business degree, you'll have the opportunity to choose from Specialist, Major, and Minor program options. A Major consists of a concentration of courses in a specific subject area and usually makes up a third of a student's total courses (6 - 9 credits). Specialists are advanced concentrations, where more than half of the courses will be in one academic area (9 - 16 credits). Minors allow students to explore their general interest in a subject area (4 - 5 credits). Overall, in an undergraduate degree, students will take a minimum of 20 credits in a variety of subjects. Programs allow students to concentrate on one or more academic areas while also taking elective courses.

Research Opportunities Program

Ready to start making your mark? Beginning in second year, the Research Opportunity Program (ROP) gives you the opportunity to conduct research outside of the classroom, working on meaningful projects with some of the University's most renowned professors – for course credit!

Career Learning

Co-op: Fast-track your career with one of the 80+ co-op program options available at U of T Scarborough – the co-op campus. Alternate study terms with work terms, for a total of 8 - 20 months of full-time, paid employment. Whether you're a management student looking at international finance in a foreign context or an aspiring biologist exploring genomics at a teaching hospital, a tailored, unique experience can be found through the co-op programs.

Professional Experience Year Co-op (PEY Co-op): Students who study engineering or an applied science program at U of T can participate in this program. Spend 12 to 16 months working alongside leaders in your field while earning a competitive salary. PEY Co-op students can gain an additional four months of work experience by participating in an optional summer position after second year.

Global Learning

Our students are in classrooms all over the world. The Centre for International Experience partners with more than 150 institutions in over 40 countries to offer a variety of global opportunities, and the Summer Abroad program offers more than 39 courses in 19 countries. U of T Scarborough co-op students may participate in international work terms, field courses and more.

Service Learning

All three campuses offer you the opportunity to combine classroom learning in a credit-earning course with real-life experiences in the surrounding community to impact critical social issues. Examples include a French student improving her language ability by working with an immigration settlement agency or a Human Biology student sharing his passion for science with young people.

Students at each of our campuses benefit from distinctive learning environments and co-curricular opportunities while earning the same prestigious U of T degree.

On all three campuses, residence is guaranteed for new full-time students entering their first year of a post-secondary program for the first time, provided that they indicate their interest in residence by completing the First Year StarRez application by **March 31**, and receive and accept an offer of admission by **June 1**. Students must respond to all deadlines and meet all deposit requirements to maintain their eligibility.




U of T St. George

Featuring a blend of neo-Gothic and ultra-modernist architecture, U of T St. George is in downtown Toronto. Since 1827, it's been home to world-class professional and postgraduate faculties, along with programs across five first-entry divisions: Arts & Science; Applied Science & Engineering; Music; Kinesiology & Physical Education; and Architecture, Landscape & Design. Every student in the Faculty of Arts & Science is affiliated with one of seven colleges: Innis, New, St. Michael's, Trinity, University, Victoria, or Woodsworth. Colleges offer students a home base and close-knit community, but do not affect program eligibility.



U of T Mississauga


Nestled in Canada's sixth largest city, U of T Mississauga is 27 km west of downtown Toronto, and is accessible by shuttle bus and public transit. Its unique programs include Canada's premier Forensic Science programs; a Department of Language Studies that offers cross-cultural linguistic, literary, and pedagogical training; two business degrees (BCom, BBA); and joint programs with Sheridan College in Art and Art History; Theatre and Drama; and Communication, Culture, Information & Technology. It is also home to one of the academies of our Faculty of Medicine, as well as the Institute for Management and Innovation, and has strong ties to government and industry throughout the City of Mississauga.



U of T Scarborough

U of T Scarborough students get a head start on their futures at U of T's co-op campus with 80+ arts, science and business co-operative learning programs. Students also acquire experience and highly desirable skills through internships, community engagement, leadership development and hands-on research with professors who are uncovering the keys to a healthy planet, a healthy population and a flourishing global society. You'll find one-of-a-kind programs in management, arts, and sciences, along with specialized programs like Mental Health Studies, International Development Studies, and combined degree options. This dynamic campus is in a multicultural neighbourhood surrounded by parklands, and features new buildings by award-winning architects, including the Toronto Pan Am Sports Centre, the Environmental Science & Chemistry Building, and Highland Hall.

St. George is the largest and most urban of U of T's three campuses. Declared: If you know which area of engineering you want to study, you can apply directly to one of the following Core 8 programs: Chemical; Civil; Computer; Electrical; Industrial; Materials; Mechanical; and Mineral. Upon completion of your Core 8 program, you'll receive a Bachelor of Applied Science (BASc) degree.

Undeclared: Known as TrackOne, this first-year program is designed for those who are interested in exploring all fields of engineering before declaring their area of interest. At the end of first year, select your place in one of the Core 8 programs for the remaining three years of your degree.

2. Engineering Science

This direct-entry program is for students who are looking for an extra academic challenge. In the first half of your four-year program, you will build your foundation in math, science, computing, humanities and a breadth of engineering topics. For the last two years of your program, you will specialize in one of eight majors: Aerospace; Biomedical Systems; Electrical & Computer; Energy Systems; Engineering Mathematics, Statistics & Finance; Engineering Physics; Machine Intelligence; or Robotics. Students in Engineering Science graduate with a BASc in Engineering Science degree.





ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Applicants who have attained a high level of academic achievement and who completely satisfy prerequisites will be considered for admission. The minimum requirements for admission consideration vary by program. You must present all the requirements, including prerequisite courses, to be considered. All of our programs have limited spaces and the admission selection process is competitive. Some programs require a supplementary application; check faculty and program admission information for details. See also: English Language Requirements. For details regarding the admission requirements for each program, visit future.utoronto.ca and refer to the information that matches your academic background.

Transfer Applicants

Arts, Science, Business (all campuses)

Applicants must meet the minimum admission requirements for their program. Refer to future.utoronto.ca for detailed information about requirements for your educational jurisdiction. Applicants who have completed studies beyond the minimum requirements at a recognized postsecondary institution will be considered for a maximum of two years of transfer credits. Transfer credits will be assessed after admission, and once the Transfer Credit Assessment application has been completed. Details will be provided after an offer of admission is made. Interviews may be required.

Applicants who already hold a bachelor's degree, or have completed more than two years of degree studies at another recognized postsecondary institution can only apply to a different field of study. For instance students who have completed a degree in, or have majored in economics, management, commerce or business, cannot complete a Bachelor of Commerce or Bachelor of Business Administration degree. If admitted to a different program, these applicants will be granted a maximum of one year of transfer credit (five full credit courses).

Undergraduate degree holders who wish to take additional undergraduate courses in their field, perhaps in order to qualify for graduate level studies, may consider applying for Non-degree studies. Please note that it may not be possible to register as a non-degree student in courses that are in high demand.

All Other Program Areas

Excellent academic achievement is required for admission consideration. Applicants admitted to other divisions may receive a statement regarding transfer credit assessment procedures at the time of admission or shortly thereafter or after registration.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE REQUIREMENTS

Proof of adequate English facility is required from all applicants except for those:

- whose first language (i.e. the language learned at home as a child) is English, or
- who have achieved satisfactory academic progress in at least four years of full-time study in an English language school system located in a country where the dominant language is English, or
- whose first language is French and who have achieved satisfactory academic progress in at least four years of full-time study in Canada.

- **Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL)**
Internet-based test: total score of 100 + 22 on writing section. Scores in a discretionary range of between 89-99+22 will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis.

System (IELTS) Academic: Minimum overall band of 6.5 with no band lower than 6.0.

- **International Baccalaureate English:** Higher Level or Standard Level English A: Literature or English A: Language and Literature with a minimum score of 4 (predicted or final). English B Higher Level is not acceptable.
- **GCSE/IGCSE/GCE O Level English:** English or English Language or English as a Second Language with minimum grade of B (or '6' in reformed qualifications).
- **GCE A/AS/AICE Level English:** English or English Language with minimum grade of 'C.'
- **Academic English Course, School of Continuing Studies, University of Toronto:** Academic English Level 60 with grade of 'B'. Detailed information at english.learn.utoronto.ca.
