



## Settle in.

Living on campus. Not only is it easier to get to classes and your myriad social activities, but you also get to know your fellow students. Some will have a similar background. Many will not. All will be interested in conversing and learning and sharing. Whether with your roommate or others in your hall, you'll gain an understanding of the United States — both its unifying culture and diverse subcultures — and learn new things about yourself as well.

Housing is available for all international students. Most Richmond students live in traditional residence halls, some of which have special academic or thematic components to enhance the residential experience. Before you arrive on campus, we will ask you to complete a "lifestyle questionnaire" so that we can match you with a roommate who shares similar living habits.













#### LIVING/LEARNING

# Class lets out and the learning continues.

Though perhaps it changes flavors as you move from lab to dining hall, from syllabus to football pitch. Spend five minutes in any spot on campus and, unless you're wearing earplugs, you're going to be changed. You'll hear theories and opinions and odd facts from other students with various dialects and points of view at any time of day or night.


Maybe you'll participate in the **Living-Learning Program** — like la Casa Hispánica or Women in Math and Science — and live alongside other students in your course. In the program, you'll deepen your learning not only through the opportunity for extended discussion, but by incorporating community-based learning experiences, attending lectures and cultural events, volunteering in the community, and more, resulting in more thorough understanding and stronger bonds with your classmates.

Or maybe you take part in the **Sophomore Scholars in Residence (SSIR)** program, which draws on the insights brought by studying and living together with other students and adds two trips into the larger world. Possibly a rural community in the Appalachian Mountains. Or maybe the capital of the Dominican Republic. Each trip allows you to experience firsthand what you have been studying in the classroom.

Whatever your living situation, you're not required to take discussion from the classroom to the common room — it just seems to happen.

What we're saying is this: Richmond students are passionate learners 24/7.





Closer than you think.

According to the experts, Richmond, Virginia, is the "Best River Town in America" (Outside magazine) and one of "America's Top 5 Cities to Keep on Your Radar"

(the *Huffington Post*).

But our students know the city as a neighbor and friend, a partner and a proving ground — just 15 minutes down the road from campus. And getting there is easy, with shuttles regularly heading into town, many stopping at useful places such as markets along the way.

Students attend events at UR Downtown, the University's home in the city. They test their knowledge through internships or research at local nonprofits, the state legislature, a Federal Reserve Bank, international media agencies, and the city's eight Fortune 500 companies. They take in art exhibits in Carytown and walk along the James in the historic River District. They engage with local schools and communities in positive collaborations. They stroll the charming cobblestones.

Richmond is a place to browse galleries on First Fridays, enjoy cuisine from France, India, and Mexico (the city boasts three chefs who have won the prestigious James Beard Award), go kayaking on the James River, or choose among the scores of arts and cultural festivals that take place throughout the year.

And that's just downtown. Go two hours in any direction, and you can swim in the ocean, climb a mountain, or explore the National Mall in Washington, D.C.

Come early. Stay late.












## A better world. A better you.






